
Happy new year! If you haven't already been to see us in 2012, we look forward to welcoming you here soon.



Family pond dipping



The bridge over the pond, a popular part of the walk between the Tal-y-fan and Carneddau Hides, is feeling its age. We'll be refurbishing it in late January, replacing the main supports, the boards and the handrails. Coed Dinefwr, based in Carmarthenshire, have come up with an interesting design that reflects the wetland habitats, and the 'reed' design handrails will extend as a fence along the edges of the pond. During the two-week construction, the bridge pond will be closed, and there may be short periods where the alternative route closer to the A55 is temporarily closed. We'll confirm dates on the website and social media as soon as we can, and alternative routes will be clearly signposted on the reserve.

Recent sightings



In between the recent gales and drizzle, hardy birdwatchers have been getting out and seeing plenty of birds around the reserve. The highlight of recent weeks have been three **firecrests**, initially found by birders looking for the reserve's first **yellowbrowed warbler** in early December. Firecrests are the same size as goldcrests, making them the smallest British bird; they don't breed in North Wales, but occur at Conwy in most winters. Look for them

between Tal-y-fan and Carneddau Hides, especially towards the A55.

The yellow-browed warbler was elusive during its ten-day stay here, after being found by its call by an alert Rob Hughes, working here on a 12-week placement. Rob soon added more scarce birds to the reserve's tally for 2011 with a smart male **yellowhammer** on 22 December, and a **razorbill** on the shoreline, though sadly the last of these was a headless corpse. By the year-end, 149 bird species had been recorded here during 2011.

It's been a good winter for **whooper swans**, with groups of up to 10 birds on several dates through November and December, while a **pale-bellied Brent goose** was among the wigeons on the estuary during the month. Two **snow buntings** were present for just a few hours on the estuary path early in December, while two **choughs** flew regularly over the reserve between their roost and feeding areas. However, it's been a poor winter for **starlings** so far, with roost counts of fewer than 1000 birds – far fewer than the 45,000 during the cold snap in December 2010! 


Keeping Conwy green

Like everyone else, we use electricity and water to manage the reserve, and we throw away some items that can't be recycled. But that doesn't stop us trying to reduce our 'footprint', the impact that we have on the Earth's limited resources.

A 'green team', comprising staff and volunteers at Conwy, monitors our performance, suggest ways to reduce our carbon emissions, our water use and our waste, and trains the reserve team in ways to be greener. We've been helped in 2011 by a clever piece of kit called a Voltage Optimiser that mediates the electricity current on the reserve, and by new kerbside recycling facilities from Conwy County Borough Council that enable us to send food waste from the coffee shop for composting. But many of the things we do are very simple things that we can all do at home and work, such as switching off lights and computers when they're not in use.

All this means that we're making some great savings:

- We've saved 88,492 litres of water since we started monitoring in April 2008. It means our water bills are lower, so we can spend more of your money on conservation.
- We've saved 20,868 kwh of electricity, and at around 10p/unit, that's over £2000 of supporters' donations that we can spend on saving nature. And importantly for the planet, that's almost 9 tonnes of carbon dioxide that we haven't released into the atmosphere.
- Our last audit in 2009 showed that we recycle 83% of our waste, and with the new food waste collection, that will almost certainly have increased in 2011.



Over the next few months, you'll be seeing new information about what we are doing to make the reserve greener, and some ideas how you can help too. Look out for posters designed by volunteer Alan Gray that will help visitors understand what we are doing, and why we think it's important.

Caitlin and Jordan help albatrosses



Caitlin and Jordan Davies, from Llysfaen, have Stepped Up for Nature, by organising a collection of used stamps for the RSPB.

They collected stamps from family, friends and at school, and delivered them to the reserve over Christmas – all 6,159 of them (they counted every one). Well done them!

The RSPB's work to save albatrosses is making a real difference, saving the lives of thousands of these huge birds in the southern oceans, by funding

local staff in Africa, Asia and South America to work with fishermen, changing the way they use baited long-lines.
