

Enhancing RSPB conwy for people and nature

It's been a while since our last bulletin and things are changing rapidly on our reserve. We've had a busy spell of paper work, experienced a few technical hitches and some periods of intense nail-biting anticipation!

Last month however, the project stepped up a gear. Part of the reserve behind the Visitor Centre is unrecognisable. Five years in the planning, and our 'village square', known as 'Y Maes,' is well and truly under way.

Despite the terrible winter weather, we now have hot water heated by the sun, every day! We're already noticing a difference in our electricity bills, which means more money for wildlife. A win-win situation!

Observatory

We're constructing a new building, with the working title of the 'Observatory'. It will be a fantastic indoor space, built into the bank with the lagoon right in front of it. It's going to be a great place to watch wildlife, and we'll use it for events throughout the year.

It's by no means a run-of-the mill design. This very special, green construction will be built out of straw bales, rendered with clay on the inside and lime on the outside.

We awarded the tender to a company called Greenbuilt last month. Work will start in April and will be completed by the end of June. Pray for dry weather! The contractors are working during weekdays only. The Visitor Centre, Coffee Shop, hides and paths beyond Y Maes site are open as usual. So please, don't let the diggers and the yellow hats put you off! It's safe to come and have a peek!

Y Ganol viewpoint

Our reserve warden, Sarah, has been supervising the construction of a new viewpoint on the Ganol trail. J.D Jones Contractors LTD Gwaenysgor, Rhyl have been awarded the contract. It will be completed at the end of March. Once the reed screen has grown, we will open this new area to the public. The viewpoint will provide an excellent vista across the lagoons, and you'll be able to have a closer views of nesting and roosting birds.

Our centrepiece is well underway and we are all bursting with excitement! In February, work started on transforming the empty brown-field land near the Visitor Centre and the Coffee Shop into a new and exciting landscaped area.

Y Maes will act as the village square of the reserve, and will give visitors the chance to explore, play, and meet up with friends - one day an events hub, the next a space to relax and unwind. The contract was awarded to landscape contractors, Wright Landscapes Limited, based in Flintshire. The work is due to be finished by end of March 2013. Wherever possible, materials have been sourced locally. Paths, surfaces and walls are made of local Llanddulas stone and the paved areas are built with Carreg Môn paving brick.


